

DR. CALEB WINFREY IS DEAD.

The Jackson County Pioneer Settled in Lone Jack in 1842.

Dr. Caleb Winfrey, 81 years old, a resident of Jackson County for seventy-two years, died yesterday in St. Joseph's Hospital. He had been going to his office daily until two weeks ago. He leaves a widow, Elizabeth A. Winfrey, 82 years old, to whom he had been married for sixty-eight years. Two children, Dr. N. B. Winfrey and Mrs. Mary J. Easley, live in this city. The grandchildren who live here are: Mrs. James H. Jackson, jr., Mrs. Leta Cook and J. W. Easley. Mrs. William E. Harrell, another grandchild, lives in Aberdeen, S. D.

The funeral will be at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning in the undertaking rooms of D. W. Newcomers' Sons, 2111 East Ninth Street. Burial will be in Pleasant Hill.

Doctor Winfrey watched the growth of Kansas City practically from its beginning, coming here in 1850. During the Civil War, as a surgeon in the Confederate Army, he conducted hospitals, at one time on a site in front of what is now the entrance to Swope Park. That was when he was with Sterling Price in the Battle of Westport. At another time he had a hospital in the old Pacific House, still standing at Fourth and Delaware streets. He reached the rank of major.

Doctor Winfrey was born in North Carolina. He came to Jackson County in 1842, living first near Lone Jack. In 1846 he married Elizabeth A. Shore in Lone Jack. Part of the Battle of Lone Jack was fought at the front door of their home. At the time of his death Doctor Winfrey was the oldest graduate of St. Louis University.
