City of Warsaw On this Fourteenth day of March A.D.

1863, personally appeared, before me, a Justice of the Peace
in and for the County and State above-named, Mrs Sarissa
Andrews, a resident of Warsaw, in the County of Hancock
and State of Illinois, aged Fifty six years, who, being first duly
sworn according to law, doth on her oath, make the following
declaration, in order to obtain the benefits of the provisions
made by the act of Congress, approved July 14, A.D. 1862,
that she is the widow of German Andrews, who died at
Warsaw, Illinois, September 27th 1853, and Mother of
Malcolm Andrews, who was a Sergeant of Company "E"
commanded by Captain George Rockwell, in the Seventh
(7th) Cavalry Regiment of Missouri Volunteers formerly
known as the "Black Hawk Regiment" in the war of 1861,
who died, on or about the 18th day of August A.D. 1862 at
Lone Jack, Jackson County, Missouri, of his wounds
received in the battle of Lone Jack on or about the
morning of August 16th A.D. 1862, while in the line of his
duty and in the military service of the United States.
She further declares that she was almost wholly dependent
upon her said son Malcolm Andrews for support for a
number of years past, that he remitted for her all a large
portion of his pay, as often as he was paid while in
said service, that he left no widow or minor child
under the age of sixteen years surviving him and that
she makes this application for Pension under the
above mentioned act and refers to the evidence filed

herewith and that in the proper departments to establish her claim. She also declares that she has not in any way been engaged in or aided or abetted the Rebellion in the United States, that she is not in receipt of a pension under the 2^d section of the act above mentioned or under any other act, nor has she again married since the death of her son, the said Sergeant Malcolm Andrews or since the death of her said husband German Andrews that she was married to the said German Andrews on or about the 7th day of May A.D. 1827 at New Hartford in the State of New York, that she is informed and believes that there is no official record of her said marriage, that the Laws of New York, at the time, required no such records to be kept. -

Mrs. Sarissa Andrews -

I doom to, and subscribe and acknowledge, before me, this day and year first above written, and on the same day personally appeared Caroline Roosevelt and Mary Morrison residents of Warsaw, County of Hancock and State of Illinois who being by me first duly sworn, say they were present and saw Mrs. Sarissa Andrews sign her name to the foregoing declaration, that they have been personally acquainted with the said Sarissa Andrews and her family for over thirty years and with the said Sergeant Malcolm Andrews from the date of his birth till his death, that they were witnesses of the marriage of the said Sarissa Andrews to the said German Andrews at New Hartford State of New York on or about May 7th 1827 and knew them to live together as husband and wife, till the death of said German Andrews on or about September 27th A.D. 1853, that they know that said

Jasina Andrews is the mother of said Malcolm Andrews
who was a sergeant of Captain George Rockwells Company
"C" of the 7th Cavalry Regiment of Missouri Volunteers formerly
known as the "Black Hawk Regiment" and who died of his wounds
received while in the service of the United States as stated
in said declaration. That the said Malcolm Andrews left
leaving him no widow, child or Father. That said Jasina
Andrews has not again married since the death of her said
husband nor since the death of her said son. That she
was almost wholly dependent upon her said son Malcolm
Andrews during a number of years past for support
and that he regularly remitted for her use a large portion
of his pay received in said service. That they reside as
above stated and are uninterested in this claim.

of Whiskey His death was caused by it
and years before his death I supported
him and my family I cannot picture
to you the sorrow my family and I ended
went from the cause I came to Warsaw
Thirty Years (in March) ago The property
I now posses came to me by the
death of a brother and for thirty
years I supported myself and family
by my needle and the sale

of property My property lies
in Wisconsin consisting of unimproved land and was a good field to me
lots My property was assessed at
fourteen hundred It is impossible to sell for any
at this time to sell for any
thing like their true value
I have 12 lots but more than
these are fractions and 2 of them
are situated in a ravine
worth but little and unsaleable
one is mortgaged for 2000 -
My house is old being built
from the sale of lots soon after
I came here and is not
much better than a barn

I had two sons enter the
army One can never return
but the youngest (not eighteen)
when discharged at Bation Road
has come home with health bad
and is of no assistance to me and
will leave home soon I expect

Malcolm was my oldest son
Long before entering the army
he helped me to support my fam-
ily buying four groceries and
did all that he was able to do
on entering the army he sent
me home all of his money
but a small sum for his
immediate expensian It was
a bitter blow to me when he
fell by a rebel shot When
taken from the field he
exclaimed dont give up He had
been wounded by a shot through
him but refused to leave the
field of action The commander
of the regiment sent me a letter
from an old officer saying
that it was manly to weep for
such as General Andrew
I am sorry that so many

Bliss of Warsaw in said County who being by me first duly sworn according to law deposes and says, that he is the son in law of Mrs Sarissa Andrews whose application for a pension on account of the loss of her eldest son at the battle of Lone Jack in Missouri is now pending before the Commissioners of Pensions and numbered 21, 327, that he has for some years been in a position to know about her pecuniary affairs and that the statements made by her in her new declaration made in December 1864 are strictly true, that she has no property to which she has a clear title and has no income and has had none for years, that she has no other means of support than was furnished her by her said Eldest Son Malcolm Andrews except such desultory and insufficient help as her younger son has been able to furnish which is at present entirely withdrawn with little prospect of yielding her any support for some years.

her said Eldest son became able to
help her, which he did to the extent
of his entire earnings above his expense



~~the undersigned Clerk of said County~~, the Clerk of the County Court of said County, the same being a court of Record and the custody of its seal being with me, Mrs Sarissa Andrews, a widow of Warsaw, in said County of Hancock and State of Illinois, aged Fifty seven years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on her oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefits of the provisions made by the act of Congress approved July 14. A.D. 1862, That she is the widow of German Andrews, who died at Warsaw, in said County of Hancock and State of Illinois, September 27. A.D. 1853 and is the Mother of Malcolm Andrews, who was a Sergeant, in Company E commanded by Captain George Rockwell, in the Seventh Cavalry Regiment of Missouri Volunteers commanded by Col. Huston, formerly known as the Black Hawk Regiment for Border State service raised by Col. Wm Bishop in the War of 1861, and who died on or

about the 18th day of August Ad 1862 at
Lone Jack, Jackson County, State of Missouri
of his wounds received in the Battle of Lone Jack
on or about the morning of August 16th, 1862,
while in the line of his duty and in the Military
Service of the United States. She further declares
that she was and has for several years past
been almost wholly dependent upon her
said Son Malcolm Andrews for support
that he was her Eldest son and main
Reliever and before the war ^{he was} working in
the Foundry of Hoberling Edwards &c of
Warsaw for wages, and learning the business
of a machinist and that while so engaged
all his earnings, over & above what suffi-
cient to clothe himself, were freely given
to the support and maintenance of his
said Mother and younger Brothers
and that so often as he was paid while
in the Military service of the United States
he remitted to his Mother for her use
a large portion of his said pay, in fact
all the surplus thereof over and above
what he considered it necessary to retain
for his own needs. That he left no
widow or minor child under the age of
sixteen years surviving him, and that she
makes this application for Pension under the
above mentioned Act and refers to the Evidence

filed herewith and that in the proper
departments to establish her claim.
She also declares that she has not in any
way been engaged in or aided or abetted
the present rebellion in the United States,
that she is not in receipt of a pension under
the 2^d section of the Act above mentioned or
under any other act, nor has she married
again since the death of her said son
Malcolm Andrews or since the death of her
said husband German Andrews - That she
was married to the said German Andrews
on or about the 7th day of May A.D. 1827 at
New Hartford, in the State of New York and
that she is informed and believes that there
is no official record of her said marriage
the laws of New York at that time not
requiring such records to be kept.

The further states that by inheritance from
her brother James M. Wells deceased, in 1835 or 1836
she became possessed of some real estate consisting
of unimproved town lots in Warsaw Illinois upon
one of which her husband in the summer of 1837
erected a small frame house which she still
occupies as a homestead with a lot near by
fenced in as a garden - that upon one other
of said lots a very poor & small frame tenement
stands almost worthless for want of repairs
and that the remainder of said lots are yet

ever have been entirely unimproved and
production of no income whatever -
That by her own exertions and by occasional
sales of lots, she has been enabled to live
and bring up her children and pay taxes upon
lots not sold till a few years since, when
being on account of disease and increasing
~~age unable longer to earn enough to~~
live and pay taxes, and there being no sale
for such property and she being thus
unable to pay taxes thereon, all of her lots
were sold for taxes and for some reason,
and by reason of loss of the ~~assister~~
of her said eldest son Malcolm. She has
been and still is unable to redeem from
said tax sale or pay up said tax claims.
That the full value of said lots so claimed
by your Petitioner and so sold from her per
taxes, including homestead as estimated
by the Assessor for 1863 was \$1335.00
She would further state that since the
expiration of her time of redemption from
above named tax sale, the said Purchaser
at said sale by failing to pay subsequent
taxes has permitted said lots to go to sale
for taxes again and that the second son
of your Petitioner, having arrived at an
age, which enables him to obtain employment
has been able with money of his own earning

to buy up nearly all of the certificates of
sale of said lots at said second sale for
taxes whereby in case said second sale
proves good or it becomes possible to buy
up the certificates of first sale your
Petitioner still hopes to obtain something
for her portion of the title to said lots
but inasmuch as the comparative
value of her title and the said two
lots titles cannot be ascertained without
suit, your petitioner does not certainly
know whether she can be properly said
to own any of said lots or not at all
whereas she cannot sell them as the title
stands at present and she would further
state that she still has one son so
young as to be dependent upon her
this brother for education and support.

her over a large portion of his pay received
while in the military service of the United
States, that they reside as above stated
and are disinterested in this claim. And they
would further state that said Caroline Roosevelt
is a Sister and said Mary Morrison is a half

Bookkeeper and paid the hands and that the
largest portion of the wages of said Malcolm Andrews
was paid in orders on Grocery and Provision
and other Stores for the support and maintenance
of his Mother, the within named Sarissa Andrews
and her family and was so taken up & applied,
that the said James B. Dodge, says he is a
member of the firm of Cox & Dodge who are and
have been since November 1861 agents of the
American Express Company, and that he has the
charge of the Books thereof and that upon

while in Missouri in the Military service of

the United States sent to his younger Brother
