On this fourteenth day of March A.D. 1863, personally appeared, before me, a Justice of the Peace in and for the County and State above named, Mrs. Sarissa Andrews, a resident of Warsaw, in the County of Hancock and State of Illinois, aged Fifty six years, who, being first duly sworn according to Law; doth on her oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefits of the provisions made by the act of Congress, approved July 14, A.D. 1862, that she is the widow of Herman Andrews, who died at Warsaw, Illinois, September 27th A.D. 1853, and Mother of Malcolm Andrews, who was a Sergeant of Company "E" commanded by Captain George Rockwell, in the Seventh (7th) Cavalry Regiment of Missouri Volunteers formerly known as the "Black Hawk Regiment" in the year of 1861, who died, on or about the 18th day of August A.D. 1862 at Lone Jack, Jackson County, Missouri, of his wounds received in the battle of Lone Jack on or about the morning of August 16th A.D. 1862, while in the line of his duty and in the military service of the United States. She further declares that she was almost wholly dependent upon her said son Malcolm Andrews for support for a number of years past, that he remitted for her one always portion of his pay, as often as he was paid while in said service, that he left no widow or minor child under the age of sixteen years surviving him and that she makes this application for Pension under the above mentioned act and refers to the evidence filed

herewith and that in the proper departments be established her claim. She also declares that she has not in any way been engaged in or aided or abetted the Rebellion in the United States, that she is not in receipt of a pension under the 2nd section of the act above mentioned, or under any other act, nor has she again married, since the death of her son the said Sergeant Malcalm Andrews, or since the death of her said husband German Andrews that she was married to the said German Andrews on or about the 7th day of May A.D. 1827 at New-Hartford, in the State of New York, that she is informed and believes that there is no official record of her said marriage, that the laws of New York, at the time, required no such records to be kept. —

Carissa Andrews is the Mother of said Malcolin Andrews who was a Sergeant of Captain George Rockwells Company "C" of the 7th Cavalry Regiment of Missouri Volunteers formerly known as the "Black Hawk Regiment" and who died of his wounds received while in the service of the United States as stated in said declaration, that the said Malcolin Andrews left surviving him no widow, child or Father, that said Carissa Andrews has not again married since the death of her said husband nor since the death of her said son, that she was almost wholly dependent upon her said son Malcolin Andrews during a number of years past for support, and that he regularly remitted for her use a large portion of his pay received in said service, that they reside as above stated and are interested in this claim.



Mr Barnett Sir I received last evening paper asking for money to write answer to what has been already shown My husband died 26 years ago leaving me with a family of ~~four~~ ^{five} ~~sons~~ and a daughter since gone to California who is married but unable to do any for himself and family My husband had not an cent of property having squandered it years before his death independent of Whiskey his death was caused by it and years before his death I supported him and my family I cannot picture to you the sorrow my family and I endured from the cause I came to Kansas thirty years (or more) ago the property I now possess came to me by the death of a brother and for thirty years I supported myself and family by my needle and the sale

of property My property lies
in Warsaw consisting of unimproved
lots My property was assessed at
fourteen hundred It is impossible
at this time to sell for any
thing like their true value

I have 12 lots but more than
third are fractions and 2 of them
are situated in a revenue
worth but little and unsalable
one is mortgaged for 2000 -

My house is old being built
from the sale of lots soon after
I came here and is not
much better than a barn

I had two sons enter the
army One can never return
but the youngest (not eighteen
when disbanded at Baton Rouge)
has come home with health bad
and is of no assistance to me and
will leave home soon I expect

Malcolm was my oldest son
and was a good child to me

Long before entering the army
he helped me to support my fam-
-ly buying four acres and
did all that he was able to do

On entering the army he sent
me home all of his money
but a small sum for his
immediate expenses It was
a little blow to me when he
fell by a rebel shot. When
taken from the field he

exclaimed Dont give up He had
been wounded by a shot through
him but refused to leave the
field of action The Commanding
of the regiment sent me a letter

from an old officer saying
that it was maly to weep for
such as Sergeant Andrew
I am sorry that so many

occupies as a homestead with a lot near by
planted in as a garden - that upon one other
of said lots a very poor ~~small~~ frame tenement
stands almost worthless for want of repairs
and that the remainder of said lots are and

over have been entirely unimproved and
production of no income whatever -
That by her own exertions and by occasional
sales of lots, she has been enabled to live

lots not sold till a few years since, when
being on account of disease and increasing

to buy up nearly all of the certificates of
sale of said lots at said second sale for
taxes, whereby in case said second sale
proves good or it becomes possible to buy
up the certificates of first sale Your
petitioner still hopes to obtain something
for her portion of the title to said lots.
but in as much as the comparative
value of her title and the said two
tax titles, cannot be ascertained without
suit. Your petitioner does not certainly
know whether she can be properly said
to own any of said lots or not, at all
