Parker certifies that Parsley received an accidental gunshot wound in the hand in the month of Oct. 1864 in consequence of which he was left behind his Company and permitted to go home, that while on the road from Secatur to Springfield, Mo., Nov. 4/64, he was killed by a band of rebel guerrillas. Private James R. Lee & Space R. Smith, same Co. & Regt. were that the soldier was wounded under the following circumstances: On or about the 10th of Oct. 1864, while the Company was in line of battle awaiting the attack of Price's army, the pickets being at the time engaged with the enemy, it was given that every man in that line of pickets were in order, and were ordered to fire a salute at a hospital, and in so doing discharged his first round, having the...

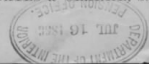

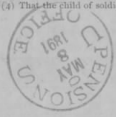

NOTES.

- The Act of June 27, 1890, requires that in minor children's cases who are permanently helpless:
- (1) That the soldier served at least ninety days in the War of the Rebellion and was honorably discharged.
 - (2) Proof of soldier's death (cause need not have been due to Army service), his marriage to mother, and proof of her death or divestment of title.
 - (3) In case a minor child is insane, idiotic, or otherwise permanently helpless, the pension shall continue during the life of said child, or during the period of such disability, and this proviso shall apply to all pensions heretofore granted or hereafter to be granted under this or any former statute, and such pensions shall commence from the date of application thereafter after the passage of this act.
 - (4) That the child of soldier was under the age of 16 years at date of the death or remarriage of widow.

That they are citizens of Benton County Missouri their P.O. address being Mount View, Missouri were well acquainted with the aforesaid George W. Parsley, being Members of the same Company and Regiment, and were present and have personal knowledge of the circumstances under which he was wounded accidentally, and on account of which wound he was absent from his said command at the time he fell into the hands of the Rebels and was put to death:-

That these circumstances were as follows:-

On or about the 10th day of October 1864 the command was in line of battle to the south of Jefferson City Missouri, awaiting the attack of Price's army, the pickets being at the time engaged with the enemy. The order was given for every man to see that his fire-arms were in good order, and George W. Parsley undertook to put a little oil on his pocket with his finger, and in doing so, discharged his pistol, wounding himself in the hand.

That said Parsley was a brave careful soldier, and they are satisfied that his discharge of his pistol was neither the result of undue carelessness, nor of a desire willfully to maim himself, but was purely accidental, induced no doubt by the hurry and excitement incident to the peculiar circumstances under which it occurred;
