LONE JACK'S SCAR OF HONOR

LITTLE LEFT EXCEPT MEMORIES OF THE BATTLE FIFTY YEARS AGO.

Tomorrow the half century anniversary of the one who first shot the flag of the Union.

Tomorrow, Friday, August 15, the day of the Lone Jack picnic will be the fifth anniversary of the battle of Lone Jack, one of the fiercest and bloodiest, for the comparatively small number of men engaged, of the entire Civil War.

How little time! As one stands in the town, almost deserted little village where Lone Jack is, he is reminded of the death of more than one hundred and fifty men in two or three hours on the scene of conflict.

The old-timers still have memories of the battle. They are scattered in the village at the time here, but in the past they were more numerous, and here and there a few men who were in the battle.

Now, as on the day of the battle, Lone Jack consists of two streets, or roads, crossing each other at right angles. One of these runs towards the north, and the other towards the south, and the battle was fought on the west and westward on the east side of the street which runs towards the north. There are three or four acres of ground, and a small church on the west side, and a small school on the east side.

This is about all there is left of the battle. The only monument is a small one on the west side of the street, and it is a simple one.
